Federal, State and Local Government representatives were present and spoke. Everyone had a great time dancing, talking and catching up with old acquaintances. During the night we all reflected on the hundreds of people who have passed through the ranks of Drouin Lions, plus the hundreds of members of the Lions Ladies Auxiliary who have worked tirelessly for the Club and its community over the last forty years. How many hours and dollars have gone into so many projects in that time? Most of it was achieved in a spirit of fun and fellowship. That's what Lions is all about. Well Done Drouin!

Membership - After a few worrying months about the decline in our District's overall membership numbers I'm happy to report that having started with 1339 it went down to 1330 and now we are up to 1361. This is quite a few up on the same time last year, which is really great news. Well Done to those clubs who made the effort and made a difference.

Club Strength - was 66 at last year's Change Over now 65 with the sad loss of 47 year old Westport Lions Club, and 41 year old Somerville Lions Club who intend to hand in their Charter on June 30th 2013. Between them both these clubs had a combined service record of 88 years. Over that incredible time, they too have had hundreds of members pass through their ranks. They have chalked up countless hours of service on numerous projects for their communities. The substantial sums of money they raised, was spent on a wide range of local, national and international humanitarian programs. We will remember them, not in sorrow, but as Clubs of Cheerful Giving to People and Places in need of a Hand.

Ride for Sight - While a number of us were attending the National Convention in Canberra the Ride for Sight this year finished at HMAS Cerebrus where the Commanding Officer Captain Katherine Richards welcomed all the riders to the Naval base. Our sincere thanks to David Koshade and his able crew for organising the 20th Annual Ride.

Anzac Day - Immediately prior to our Convention at which 1000 people attended, this year for the first time, the RSL organisers of the Canberra Anzac Day March, permitted a sizable contingent of almost 400 Lions in uniform with medals to participate in the march. District 201 V3 members who marched looked great on TV.

Dick Smith was a keynote speaker at the Convention, thanking Lions for their humanitarian service and setting such an excellent example of altruism by assisting those less fortunate than themselves. He used the occasion to highlight the difference between Australian Lions (his father in law was a Lion) and those few local Billionaires who give little or nothing for their incredible gains. Dick and Pip Smith had only two days before given Lions (Australian Lions Foundation) a personal cheque for **One Million Dollars** to assist those less fortunate than ourselves. Wow!

The Hon. Anna Burke, Speaker of the House of Representatives, was another keynote speaker who spoke frankly about the various tensions of the House she, as Speaker, has to deal with on a daily basis. These tensions not only arose from various party squabbles within the House, but might also arise when welcoming visiting dignitaries and delegations from overseas, or simply keeping them apart when they visit on the same day. She thanked Lions, on behalf of the Australian Parliament, for the good work they do. She completed her speech with suggestions for several tourist attractions we should not miss while visiting Canberra.

District Chairman Professor Peter Blamey was successful in getting the Neurobionics Research Project passed as a National Project.

I know there's another ten weeks to roll by before I officially hand over to District Governor Elect David Barnes and his administration. So there is still a lot to do. I hope my Cabinet can keep the momentum going.

By the time you read this newsletter the Officer Training Day will have been completed at the Churchill Campus of Monash University on May 19th. To all participants - I wish you well.

Throughout the months of June and July Pam and I will be attending a number of Club Change Over Functions across the District. We look forward to catching up again and saying thank you for making our year such a memorable one.

I also look forward to seeing many of you at the District Change Over Lunch at the Warragul Club on Sunday July 21st.

Finally - to all 12 Zone Chairpersons for travelling so far, so often and introducing us to each of the Clubs within your Zones - to the clubs themselves for making us so welcome - to each of the District Chairpersons for the passion and dedication you showed in your particular field of expertise and responsibility - and to each member of my loyal and hard working Executive - I offer a very big **Thank You for a job Well Done**.

Being Green

Checking out at the shop, the young cashier suggested to the much older woman, that she should bring her own grocery bags because plastic bags weren't good for the environment.

The woman apologized and explained, "We didn't have this 'green thing' back in my earlier days."

The young clerk responded, "That's our problem today. Your generation did not care enough to save our environment for future generations."

She was right - our generation didn't have the 'green thing' in its day.

Back then, we returned soft drink bottles and beer bottles to the store. Our empty milk bottles were collected daily and went through the same process.

Grocery stores bagged our groceries in brown paper bags, that we reused for numerous things, most memorable besides household garbage bags, was the use of brown paper bags as book covers for our schoolbooks.. This was to ensure that public property, (the books provided for our use by the school) was not defaced by our scribbles. Then we were able to personalize our books on the brown paper bags.



But too bad we didn't do the "green thing" back then.

We walked up stairs, because we didn't have an escalator in every store and office building. We walked to the grocery store and didn't climb into a 300-horsepower machine every time we had to go two blocks.

But she was right. We didn't have the "green thing" in our day.

Back then, we washed the baby's nappies because we didn't have the disposable kind. We dried clothes on a line, not in an energy-gobbling machine burning up 220 volts -- wind and solar power really did dry our clothes back in our early days. 
But that young lady is right; we didn't have the "green thing" back in our day.

Back then, we didn't fire up an engine and burn petrol just to cut the lawn. We used a push mower that ran on human power. We exercised by working so we didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity.

We drank from a bubbler when we were thirsty instead of using a cup or a plastic bottle every time we had a drink of water. We refilled writing pens with ink instead of buying a new pen, and we replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull.



But we didn't have the "green thing" back then.

Back then, people took the train or a bus and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their mums into a 24-hour taxi service in the family's \$45,000 SUV or van, which cost what a whole house did before the "green thing." We had one power point in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances. And we didn't need a computerized gadget to receive a signal beamed from satellites 23,000 miles out in space in order to find the nearest fish and chip shop.



But isn't it sad that the current generation laments how wasteful we old folks were just because we didn't have the "green thing" back then?
